RENEE NGANDAWARRKIRR

Renee Ngandawarrkirr Wilson is a Lardil woman from Mornington Island. Having grown up around strong Elders she learned the cultural dances and stories of her people.

She has toured professionally with the Mornington Island Dancers from 1997 to 2015 across Australia and in Japan.


Renee has exhibited her paintings in group exhibitions in Brisbane and Cairns and was part of the movement that saw the development of contemporary style painting for Mornington Island artists.

In 1998, she completed her Traineeship in Photographic Curation at Woomera Aboriginal Corporation.

With her passion for keeping cultural stories alive, Renee trained with Martha Mollison, Jan Cattoni and Rhett Hammerton. She has since directed and edited The Old Fellas documentary in 2013 for which she received the Best Community Video Award at the 13th Remote Indigenous Media Festival, written and directed Jimmy's Story short drama in 2014 and produced a short stop-motion animation Turtle Hunt in 2016.

Renee is currently developing a feature script.


HOW WE FUND THE FESTIVAL

INCOME



WHERE THE FESTIVAL FUNDS GO

EXPENSES



- Substantial in-kind contribution from IRCA, host RIMO & community, ICTV, RIMOs & delegates.
- CBF grant (\$50k) and Screen Australia (\$10k) are the only consistent funding sources.
- Significant proportion of funding from state agencies and local sponsorship needed.
- Delegates are charged minimal fees that contribute towards catering and accommodation costs.
- To make the event as assessable as possible and maximise participation, IRCA does not charge registration fees for Remote Indigenous Media Organisation (RIMO) delegates and negotiates discounts for other remote Indigenous media agencies and practitioners.

TOTAL INCOME (CASH + IN-KIND)≈\$400,000

- Substantial cost is delegate travel (2/3 in-kind). Most RIMOs travel by road as air travel increases expenses significantly.
- including diabetic considerations are taken into account.

TOTAL EXPENSE ≈ \$400,000

MEDIA STORY 2

BERNARD 'BALA B' NAMOK JNR

Bernard is originally from Thursday Island in the Torres Strait and has a family background from St Paul (Moa Island), Badu and Darnley Island. He started his broadcasting career in the studios of Radio 4MW 'The Voice of the Torres Strait' back in 2002. He joined the TEABBA team in Darwin in 2009. Bernard has a graduate diploma in broadcasting.

He has received the Koori Mail Scholarship for most outstanding contribution to radio broadcasting, and has won numerous awards over the years including Emerging Talent at the National Remote Indigenous Media Festival in 2009, Top End Unsung Hero 'Youth of the Year' for the Darwin NAIDOC Awards in 2010 and has been nominated twice for the Deadly Award for Broadcaster of the Year in 2011 and 2013. Bernard also received the AFTRS scholarship to continue in his media career in 2015.

He enjoys getting out to the RIBS communities to run training workshops or host live broadcasts at festivals.

Bernard is now co- producing a documentary telling the story of the Torres Strait Flag.

HOST COMMUNITY

Guidance and support from the Traditional Owners of the Lands is essential to the Festival. Permission from the Traditional Owners of the Lands is central to the site selection process. Thereafter, the appropriate representatives of the community decide on the unique theme and artwork that will shape the event. The public events and local activities such as special site visits are arranged collectively and local protocols are provided to delegates to respect the community's residents and customs. Examples include information about trespassing private areas and sacred space, dress code and use of photography.

The Festival cannot take place without the generous contribution from community members and organisations. The local Council, the art centre, supermarket, petrol station, night patrol and transport hire services, to name but some of the service providers.

TORRES STRAIT ISLANDS

TORRES STRAIT ISLANDS



Situated off the coast of the Cape York Peninsula in Queensland, Australia are the beautiful Torres Strait Islands, home to one of Australia's oldest Indigenous Radio Stations. Radio 4MW broadcasts in the four primary languages of the Torres Strait, which include Torres Strait Creole, Australian English, Kalaw Legaw Ya and Meriam Mir.

INVESTING IN THE COMMUNITY

Resources and services from local enterprises in the community and the surrounding area are utilised where possible. The Festival schedule is tailored to the requests of community residents for participation and inclusion, such as school students and senior citizens.
