#### **FESTIVAL INFORMATION**

#### Registration

When you arrive at Ntaria/Hermannsburg please come to the Festival Site at the Historic Precint (see map). Registration is located in the Festival Hub area. IRCA and CAAMA staff will assist you at the registration desk and identify where you will be staying or camping.

You can collect your nametags and relevant info at the registration desk. You will also be provided with a tote bag, a water bottle and a USB wristband that are yours to keep! The wristband identifies you to the catering staff.

#### Catering:

The Festival Dining area is located in the Historic Precinct for breakfast, lunch and dinner and morning and afternoon tea. Tea and Coffee will be available all day. The Historic Precinct Tea Rooms sell delicious scones, apple strudel and other tasty treats.

#### **Accommodation:**

If you have any questions about accommodation please contact <u>festival@irca.net.au</u> prior to the event or talk to Imogen at the Festival. We will have extra tents and mattresses available on-site. If you are camping please remember to bring your own pillow, sleeping bag / sheets.

#### **Security**

Your valuables are your own responsibility. Take measures to keep them safe. Carry them with you or lock them in cars. We will provide lock up for small valuables (ie. phone, laptop) at the Festival Site.

Only Telstra Mobile reception is available. Telstra Next G is available in the community if you have a dongle. Thanks to Telstra, free wi-fi will be available at the Festival site and workshop precinct. Please keep your phone turned off (or limit use) between 9-5.30 pm to free up CAAMA's OB connection! Thank you!

#### **Toilets and Showers**

Toilets are at the Historic Precinct and Workshop Precinct (Ntaria School & WAHAC Function Room). There are also toilets and showers at Ntaria campground and Tjuwanpa Outstation.

There are two general stores at Ntaria for those forgotten items – mozzie repellant, batteries, sweets etc. Finke River Mission Store opposite the Historic Precinct and the Top Store opposite the Campground.

Fuel is available at the Top Store, Ntaria (Opal Unleaded and Diesel ONLY).

**ATMs** are located in Top Store Supermarket and General Store opposite Historic Precinct.

TRADITIONAL OWNERS OF NTARIA welcome you to the Community, and ask that you respect its residents and customs in the following ways:

- Do NOT photograph or enter residential areas of the community without invitation.
- Please keep away from the Men's Area (located on the map)
- DO NOT bring alcohol or drugs into the Community.
- Respect the 40KM Speed Limit
- WATCH OUT for horses and other livestock along the Larapinta Road (between Alice Springs and Ntaria)

Traditional Owners recommend that delegates do not drive to Alice Springs after dark.

#### ABOUT THE FESTIVAL

Each year the National Remote Indigenous Media Festival brings together community broadcasters and media producers from across remote Australia. A different RIMO (Remote Indigenous Media Organisation) hosts the Festival each year, with the location alternating between coastal and desert communities.

The Festival is a key part in the development of Aboriginal media practitioners and aims to strengthen the media industry in remote communities. It creates opportunities for trainees, practitioners and people interested in remote media from all regions to network; share stories; grow their skills and knowledge; receive recognition and encouragement for their work; and provide grass roots feedback to the peak body.

A highlight of the festival is the Remote Media Awards Ceremony where individuals from RIMO networks and remote communities are recognised for their achievements, and work keeping Remote Aboriginal media strong.

#### **ABOUT NTARIA COMMUNITY**

Ntaria (Hermannsburg) is in Western Arrernte country. Located 124km south-west of Alice Springs, this is one of the most picturesque areas of Central Australia set amongst the rolling hills of the MacDonnell Ranges.

The town of Hermannsburg was originally established as a mission by German Lutheran Missionaries in 1877. The National Heritage Listed Historic Precinct in the centre of town will be the main location for the festival.

Now known as Ntaria, the community is located within the MacDonnell Shire and has a population of 700 people. It has a vibrant arts community well known for its watercolour paintings, pottery and music.

It is famously known as the home of renowned landscape artist Albert Namatjira who inspired the Hermannsburg School of watercolour painters. More recently, Ntaria has also become known for its pottery and Ladies Choir.


Ntaria is also the home of singer/songwriter Warren H Williams, a Red Ochre Award recipient and regular CAAMA radio broadcaster.







#### **ABOUT CAAMA**

The Central Australian Aboriginal Media Association (CAAMA) began operations in 1980 and was the first Aboriginal organization to be allocated a broadcasting license. CAAMA serves The Aboriginal people of Central Australia through an association regulated under the Incorporations Act, and its objectives focus on the social, cultural and economic advancement of Aboriginal peoples.



CAAMA is passionate about promoting and sharing Aboriginal culture, language, dance, and music while generating economic and social benefits in the form of training, employment and income generation.

CAAMA operates in three main areas. CAAMA Radio, CAAMA Music, and CAAMA Productions. These three areas are ably supported by the CAAMA Technical Department which also provides technical services to other organizations.

CAAMA Library contains over 50,000 hours of archived content and is at the forefront of archive strategy. By developing a *hub-and-spoke* system of media management archiving, CAAMA is the media management and archiving *hub* for other smaller, less financial Aboriginal media organisations (the *spokes*). Other media organisations can feed into CAAMA's media management system.

CAAMA Radio 8 kin fm, broadcasts 24 hours a day from its home in Alice Springs, and can also be heard through an internet stream on the CAAMA website http://caama.com.au

CAAMA Radio's commitment to remote broadcasting is central to its philosophy and the station supports a number of RIBS studios and broadcasters on remote communities. As well as local RIBS broadcasting, RIBS shows are also presented over the CAAMA network.

CAAMA Radio News reports events from an Aboriginal perspective. More and more mainstream media is picking up on aboriginal matters through these reports and the CAAMA Radio News online presence. 8KIN-FM's interview programs put our listeners' voices to air, alongside Indigenous voices from other parts of the country.

CAAMA Music started 30 years ago as a record label to support and present aboriginal culture and language through music. Today, as well as recording and selling that music, the label also provides an artist management service.

CAAMA Music runs the Regional Music Development Program. Under that program CAAMA is training 16 Music Industry rangers over the next Three years.

CAAMA Music also provides an equipment hire service.

CAAMA Productions is the largest Indigenous production house in Australia, supporting award winning Indigenous producers, directors, camera crews and editors. CAAMA Productions provides a full range of digital production and post-production services, and facilities.

Across all its operations CAAMA strives to empower people and engender pride in Aboriginal culture while informing the wider community, both nationally and internationally, of the richness and diversity of the Aboriginal peoples of Australia and their cultures.

#### **BACKGROUND AND HISTORY OF IRCA**

The Indigenous Remote Communications Association (IRCA), is the peak body for remote Indigenous media and communications. IRCA asserts, through its membership and Board, its authentic, specialist and direct representation of the media and communications interests of remote and very remote Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities in Australia.



IRCA recognizes that remote indigenous media practice has an historical and proven role in the maintenance of language and culture, self–representation and community development; and that remote indigenous media organisations have played a pro–active and decisive role in the development of a remote media and communications industry.

IRCA was founded in 2001, and has been operating now for 12 years. It advocates on behalf of remote Indigenous people with regard to media and communications services. It also offers industry development, strategic, management and policy support to the sector. IRCA represents 147 Remote indigenous Broadcasting Services (RIBS) across Australia, supported by eight Remote Indigenous Media Organisations (RIMOs):

- Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (PY) Media
- Ngaanyatjarra Media
- Pintubi Anmatjerre Warlpiri (PAW) Media & Communications
- Pilbara and Kimberley Aboriginal Media (PAKAM)
- Top End Aboriginal Bush Broadcasting Association (TEABBA)
- Queensland Remote Aboriginal Media (QRAM)
- Central Australian Aboriginal Media Association (CAAMA)
- Torres Strait Indigenous Media Association (TSIMA)

The RIBS communities are made up of populations of at least 80% Indigenous people. However IRCA advocates for the provision of media and communications in all remote Indigenous communities and for all Indigenous people living in remote Australia. There are currently 1113 remote Indigenous communities.

RIMOs provide a range of support services to their RIBS network within their region, including: training and employment, production support, regional radio networks, technical support, regional coordination, other media programs (e.g. music, ICT, archiving), and representation in the national forum. RIBS provide local radio and television production and re-broadcasting facilities where local Aboriginal people have produced programs and stories in local language(s) for broadcast either locally, regionally or nationally.

IRCA is also committed to seeing the ongoing provision of Indigenous Community Television (ICTV) for remote viewers via its own full-time digital satellite channel. With ICTV, IRCA also comanages and moderates an online platform (<a href="www.indigitube.com.au">www.indigitube.com.au</a>) to provide appropriate content, and provide Indigenous media producers with a showcase for the work.

In the last year, IRCA has co-hosted the 'Broadband for the Bush' forum with Desert Knowledge Australia and advocated strongly for issues relating to the Digital TV Switchover. IRCA has an Advisory Group made up of RIMO Managers and technicians working in remote regions. IRCA also co-organises the National Remote Indigenous Media Festival in a different region each year, with recent festivals hosted by PAKAM in Djarindjin, TSIMA in Thursday Island and PY Media in Umuwa SA.

#### **ABOUT ICTV**

The Remote Indigenous Media Festival has always been an important event for the ICTV Calendar.

The idea of an Indigenous community television service for remote Indigenous communities was first discussed at the 3rd Remote Media Festival in Umuwa in 2001, and the Inaugural Meeting for ICTV was held in Balgo in 2006 at the Remote Media Festival. Many of the founding members of ICTV are regular delegates at the Remote Media Festival. ICTV has been managing the video and content awards, and screenings since the 12th Remote Media Festival held on Thursday Island in 2010.

ICTV is the only television service specifically for Indigenous Australians living in remote areas of the country. Since December 2012 ICTV has been operating its own dedicated digital television service on Channel 601 on the VAST satellite platform. By December 2013 ICTV will be available as a direct-to-home service to almost all Indigenous Australians in remote communities though the Satellite Subsidy Scheme administered by DBCDE.

ICTV broadcasts television content made by and for Indigenous Australians in remote communities. Our content includes cultural material such as Inma, bush trips and traditional stories; community videos; music videos and concerts; children's programming and more.

ICTV also operates the video-streaming element of IndigiTUBE (<a href="http://www.indigitube.com.au">http://www.indigitube.com.au</a>).
